## Commas and Conjunctions



A comma is used just before a little conjunction (and, but, for, nor, or, so, yet) to separate two different clauses or parts of a sentence.

Examples: The worm looked yummy, so I ate it.

I knew \$20 was too much for a gumball, but I really wanted it.
