


Suicide Prevention Presentation

He shared several stories of bullying and depression, but his most inspiring and personal story involved the death of his son. Bo "had OCD and was popular and nice."

The presentation was called "Under the Helmet and Hat is a Child who needs us" and included information on treatments and bullying, and stressed what bullying is and what it is not. The song "Hold On" by Good Charlotte, which was about the suicides of people who are loved, was played.

Bo Tkach Foundation donates money to teens who can't afford counseling or mental health insurance. These donations help children find what they need to continue on with their lives in a productive and informed manner. The Michigan Depression Center sponsored his program, and at the end of the show he was given a \$300 check for the foundation

The contest is a joint effort of the Knights of Columbus and the Diocesan Office of Pro-life and Social concerns.


Health Day



The History of Ash Wednesday By Zack White

Ash Wednesday is a rather well known and widely celebrated holiday in the Catholic faith. It takes place 46 days before Easter and is the first day of Lent. On this day, the people of the church will go to receive ashes. The reasoning behind the ashes is commonly said to be that they represent the dust in which God created mankind from. The ashes themselves are made from the burned palm from the Palm Sunday of the year prior. These ashes are placed on their foreheads in a cross shape and as the priest does this, he will usually say, " Remember that you are dust, and to dust you will return." Considering that this day is extremely well known and has some deeply rooted traditions, it begs the question, where exactly did

Ash Wednesday come from and why do we

Despite it being a primarily Catholic day, Ash Wednesday actually comes from Judaism, being from their tradition and penance and fasting. This day wasn't even accepted in the Catholic faith until 325 AD at the Council of Nicaea where they had already settled upon a 40 day fasting period to celebrate Lent. The actual starting date

of Lent was still questioned for years to come and even changed. Eventually in 601, Pope Gregory made Ash Wednesday the beginning of Lent and he implemented the tradition of marking the people's foreheads with ash. However, even with the day being officially recognized by a Pope, Ash Wednesday is never mentioned in the

Bible.

Here ar Marian we are no exception to getting ashes on that day. During our usual Wednesday mass, several teachers helped Fr. Miller distribute the ashes before the preparations of the gifts to the song "Ashes" of course.

President's Day

President's Day is more than just one of the two major holidays in February, the other being Valentine's Day. It is



a day set to commemorate all presidents, past and present, although it has not always been that way.

Originating after his death, Washington's Birthday was celebrated during much of the 1800s as an unofficial day of remembrance of the birth of one of America's most prominent figures. Signed into law by President Rutherford B. Hayes, it became a Federal holiday and was celebrated on Washington's birthday on February 22nd.

This tradition would come to an end with the passing of the Uniform Holidays Act in the 1960s. This act changed the celebration of Washington's Birthday from his birthdate of February 22nd to the third Monday of February, in an attempt to create more three day weekends for all of the nation's workers. Some other Federal holidays that joined Washington's Birthday in moves to Monday in their respective months were Columbus Day and Memorial Day.

This change led many to believe that the new date was chosen to combine the dates of Washington's date of birth and Lincoln's date of birth, February 12th, although this was primarily somewhat of a coincidence. By the mid 1980s, Washington's Birthday was widely referred to as President's Day, with a lesser focus on Washington himself and a greater focus on all U.S. Presidents' accomplishments, however Washington and Lincoln remain the most prominent faces of the holiday to this day.

Despite changes to the national holiday of Washington's Birthday, President's Day still holds true to the holiday's original meaning: reverence towards and remembrance of our country's great



leaders. It stands as a day of patriotism for those proud of the achievements of former Presidents, and it is a day of inspiration for Americans as well as present and future American leaders to strive

for greatness through their own trying times of adversity.

Eagles stun Patriots for first NFL Championship in Super Bowl Era

On February 4, 2018 history was made. Super Bowl LII featured two teams; the New England Patriots and the Philadelphia Eagles, each posting a record of 13-3 heading into the championship game. There was much at stake for each franchise. For the Patriots, their goal was to win their sixth Super Bowl in the franchise history; which would have tied the Pittsburgh Steelers for most Super Bowl's in the history of the NFL. For the Eagles, at stake was stopping Patriots quarterback Tom Brady from winning his sixth Super Bowl ring; which would have solidified his status as one of the greatest of all time. More importantly for the Eagles, a Super Bowl victory would mean the first in the history of the franchise; something that would mean the world to the city of Philadelphia.

Just one year ago, Eagles quarterback Nick Foles decided to step away from the game of football after four years with both Philadelphia and St. Louis. Today, he finds himself a Super Bowl champion; a feat most quarterbacks could only dream of accomplishing. For the Eagles, the momentum shift came on a fourth down play just before heading into halftime. In a three point game against the defending Super Bowl champions, Eagles' head coach Doug Pederson reached into his bag of tricks; running a play borrowed from the Chicago Bears in a Week 17 game of the 2016 season; sending quarterback Nick Foles out of the backfield to catch the biggest (and only) touchdown of his career. Heading into the half, the Philadelphia Eagles clung to a 22-12 lead.

Entering the third quarter, the Patriots received the ball. Tom Brady and the Patriots put together multiple scoring drives, but every single time they drove down the field, the Eagles answered with a stronger counterattack. Late in the fourth, Tom Brady had two chances to lead his team down the field for the game-winning score; each time coming up empty-handed. One last desperation heave to the end zone fell incomplete; delivering the 2017-2018 Philadelphia Eagles their first ever Super Bowl Title.



Multiple records were broken in the game; first and foremost with the two teams combining for 1,151 total yards of

scrimmage; the most in any modern NFL game. Eagles quarterback Nick Foles took home the Super Bowl MVP trophy and the Eagles began to plan their parade. Riding through the playoffs with the "underdog" mentality; it was the picture perfect ending to the Philadelphia Eagles season. Super Bowl LII will go down as one of the greatest games in history for the city of Philadelphia.
