Marian has Middle States Visit

On April 25 – 28 Middle States, an association that performs peer evaluations and accreditations, came to Marian to evaluate the school for accredidation. This is an institution that is accredited when the education community has verified that its goals are achieved through self-regulation and peer review.

To find out more of what Middle states is all about, I talked to Ms. Velekei, an English teacher at Marian Catholic High School, who was picked to be an evaluator at a Catholic High School in Philadelphia. She stated "evaluating another school allowed me to gain knowledge of what we can focus on for our school. It also gave me a perspective on how schools get evaluated."

Middle States emphasize functions rather than specific structures, recognizing that there are many different models for educational and operational excellence. Ms. Velekei says "When middle states come here, we as a school need to make them feel welcome. We also share with them information of our goals and aid them in evaluating our school.

Middle States has seven standards and fifteen requirements. These serve as an ongoing guide for those institutions considering application for membership. Those accepted as candidate, and those accredited institutions engaged in self-review and peer evaluation. Each standard is expressed in one or two sentences and then followed by criteria. Ms. Velekei says "As a group we have set goals to better our community. For instance we have focused on student activity, facility, career readiness and many other things."

By the last day of the visit at Marian by the Middle States committee, they had visited with teachers and students as well as observing both in action in the classroom. Then they met with the teachers of the school to announce their decision which was they would recommend that Marian once again be accredited by the Middle States Organization. Congratulations to All!



International Children's Book Day! BY Mikhaila Racho


