


The Epiphany of the Lord

The Epiphany of our Lord is the Christian feast celebrated on January 6. This feast celebrates the ways in which Christ has made himself known to the entire world. The main three events that revealed the mission of Christ are the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1 -12), the baptism of Jesus (Mark 1:9-11), and the miracle at Cana (John 2:1-11). When the Magi makes a visit, it is usually emphasized on Epiphany Day and Christ's baptism is then celebrated on the first Sunday that follows. The word "Epiphany" comes from the word epiphainen which is a verb that comes from the Greek language. The word epiphainen means "to shine upon" or "to make known". The Epiphany is a holy day of obligation.

Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Martin Luther King Jr. day is dedicated to Martin Luther King Jr. because he was best known for advancing civil rights through nonviolence and civil disobedience. He did many things to help the Civils Rights community during the 1950s and 60s. King led the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott which was a political and social protest campaign against the policy of racial segregation on the public transit system of Montgomery, Alabama. After the Montgomery bus boycott, in 1957 he became the president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. He continued his leadership through the next years of his life which unfortunately ended on April 4, 1968. King was fatally shot by James Earl Ray. King wrote the famous speech I Have a Dream. He is still acknowledged today as one of the greatest civil rights activist of all time.


In a recent interview with Maggie Joseph, a senior member of the Journalism class, she was asked what she likes most about winter.

MARIAN CATHOLIC CHERISHES LIFE

Students attend the March for Life in Washington D.C.

WASHINGTON D.C. - The debate has been argued for many years whether it is a women's choice to abort an infant in the womb or give birth to the baby. The birth of the child puts circumstances to the side and chooses to participate in God's plan of creation and life.

The issue of abortion and the law that the Church and the school is fighting against in this country stemmed from the infamous Roe v. Wade Supreme Court Case.

The history of the Roe v. Wade case started when Norma McCorvey, known as Jane Roe in the court case, wanted an abortion in Texas. Abortion was illegal in Texas.

She was challenged by Henry Wade, a pro-life district attorney in Dallas County, Texas. The case went to the Supreme Court and it was ruled 7-2 that abortion was legal in Texas under the ruling that the 14th amendment affirmed a women's right to privacy under "equal protection of the law."

The students at Marian Catholic who support the Catholic Church's stance chose the right to life position as they attended the 46th annual March for Life in Washington D.C. on Friday, January 18th. The mass to start the day of prayer and support for life was cancelled due the weather.

The students packed the bus at 8 am in either Frackville or Nesquehoning to be transported to the March for Life. Once the students were dropped off at the March for Life, they heard a variety of speakers reinforce the need to support life and overturn the legality of abortion along with refuting the pro-choice arguments. Marian Catholic sophomore Ben Artz commented, "They added an element of enthusiasm to a day filled with joy and reminded us all to march for those who can't speak for themselves." He added, "Specifically, Ben Shapiro's speech helped reinforce the pride we were feeling at that moment."



Supporters eagerly gather at 12th street on the National Mall in Washington D.C. to listen to speakers on the pro-life movement and its standing in current society. The crowd was shocked when VP Mike Pence spoke and President Donald Trump addressed the marchers via video. "It was great seeing everyone come together for a **4** great cause." Marian Catholic freshman John Milosh said. The surprises of the magnitude of prominent speakers fired up the masses to march for life. A first time pro-life marcher, Marian Catholic senior Lidia Sokarda, was amazed at the speeches being presented. "My favorite part of the march was hearing our vice-president and his wife along with a video of Trump speak." She elaborated, "It was great seeing Americans unite for this great cause."

The March for Life itself started around 1 pm after the participants heard all of the speeches. There was a purpose behind the marching for life that members of Marian Catholic expressed. Senior Zach Mauro stated, "All it takes for evil to prosper is for good people to do nothing." He explained further, "Now is the time where we must put everything on the line, even our lives if necessary, to end the merciless slaughter of abortion."

The organizer of the Frackville bus congregation for the retreat and the chaplain at Marian Catholic Father Brian Miller offered his purpose to be present at the March for Life. "The march we participate in every year lets the public know that we still care about the dignity of human life."

The March for Life commenced at 12th street by the National Mall and followed Constitution Avenue between 12th and 14th streets. Marian Catholic students and faculty provided their motivation on why they attended the March for Life. First time attendee, senior Zach Boyer stated, "I decided to attend in order to show my protest for the abomination of abortion and to urge officials to make a moral change to protect life."



An organized group of excited chanters for life hold up their signs proudly as they walk along Constitution Avenue at the March for Life in Washington D.C. They were singing occasionally as some of their chants included "We love babies! How about you?" to entice the droves of people. "It made me feel like hope is still out there even with all the negative news in the world." senior Sarah Mutsenburger commented.

Marian Catholic English Department chair, teacher, and pro-life advocate Ms. Velekei shared her thoughts on why she comes annually to the March for Life. "I believe everyone should experience the March for Life and more importantly as a Catholic, I strongly believe that every child that is conceived has a right to life."

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MARCH continued:

She completed her point by saying, "The March for Life unites all those in the common cause to defend life."

The bus then departed with the members of the school and parishes back home but first they stopped at Baltimore's Inner Harbour for dinner. Ariel Stanalonis, a senior at Marian Catholic, extended her view on the food and the sights of the Inner Harbour. "The end of the day was the icing on the cake as I was able to eat at the Cheesecake Factory and

the food was out of this world. It was such a fine way to wrap up the day." After enjoying a bite to eat, the buses drove back to

Frackville and Nesquehoning, respectively to drop off the members after a day in Washington D.C. The members on the trip were glad they went and would participate again to protect all human life.
