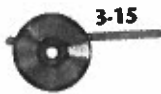

Beware of Crocodile Moves!

Look at the **A** and **B** sections as you sing this song. Watch out for the **D.C. al Fine** at the end of the **B** section. Where will you go next?

D.C. al Fine is an Italian musical term that tells you to go back to the beginning of the song and sing until you see the word *Fine* [FEE-neh].

Make up a clapping game with a friend. Play it as you sing the song. Move to a new partner for each section.
