After one of the most heated election cycles in U.S history it is finally officially over. Donald J. Trump, who defeated Hillary Clinton on November 8th to become the 45th President of The United States, was sworn into office on Friday, January 20th during the 58th Inauguration in our country's history. This reporter left my aunts house in Bethesda at about 6 AM and took the metro downtown, every train was packed. They were calling for a lot of rain but it basically stayed pretty dry. It was packed with people and hard to move around. It was like the city was on lockdown with all the streets and monuments closed. A lot of police were present. They also had Army men and women at every Metro station to help keep things moving and to enforce the area. These peopel were needed since it wasn't all peaceful as some protesters got violent by burning cars, breaking store windows, and throwing rocks and other objects at police in protest of the newest President. D.C basically funneled everyone down the same streets causing confusion and people lost patience because of the large crowds. We stood around for about six hours but it was well worth it once he took the oath.

Mr. Trump's first address after becoming President was just over 16 minutes long in which he said "Today we are not merely transferring power from one administration to another, or from one party to another- but we are transferring power from Washington, D.C. and giving it back to you, the people."

But this was not the only thing happening that day for the new president. Inauguration events kicked off on the 19th when Mr. Trump lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknon Soldier Wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National cemetery to honor our fallen soldiers, a U.S tradition. Then later that night the welcome celebration occurred at the Lincoln Memorial where Mr. Trump made an appearance. His night ended with a candlelight dinner at Washington's Union Station to thank donors. On Friday, January 20th after a private early prayer service, Mr. Trump took the oath of office around noon and became the 45th President of the United States.

The festivities didn't end there, after President Trump was sworn into office, the Obamas bid there farewell and departed from the Capitol building. The Inaugural Parade then began around 3:00 where President Trump and Vice-president Pence led the parade from the Capitol building down Pennsylvania Avenue, with thousands of military personnel who represented each branch. After the parade the Inaugural balls began around 7 PM where President Trump made an appearance at three of them.

The Inaugural events officially ended on Saturday, January 21st where the new President attended the National Prayer service at 10 AM at the Washington National Cathedral.

For myself, it took about an hour to catch a train on the way back, but the events and experiences of the day were worth the wait.

Colts have big week against rivals By Alec Whitaker


