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The Celebration of Oktoberfest By Vladimir Holoviak

It's that time of year when people all over celebrate the month of October and the great fall harvest and especially their German heritage. They even call these celebrations Octoberfest but that's not really what they are. There is a real Octoberfest which may have started them all.

Oktoberfest is the time of year when people from all over the world get together to celebrate a 200 year old tradition that includes drinking beer, eating German food, watching some Schuhplattler dancers slap their knees, and just in general, making merry. Here's a little background.

The first Oktoberfest was on 12 October 1810 when Crown Prince Ludwig, who later became King Ludwig I, married the princess Teresa of Sassonia-Hildburghausen. A celebration was held in the fields in front of the city gate. All the citizens of Munich were invited and the the fields from that day forward were called "Theresienwiese" or Teresa's Meadow, in honor of the princess. It was later shortened to "Wies'n." The closing ceremony included horse races and a feast. A decision to repeat the horse races the following year began what is now known as Oktoberfest.

Throughout the years, adjustments were made. For example, some rides and swings were added in 1818, and more impactful, in 1819, the duration of Oktoberfest was lengthened and the start date was made earlier to include some of the longer and warmer days of September. Fast forward to 1850 when the Statue of Bavaria was built making it a piece of Oktoberfest. From 1887 onwards, an opening parade was once again used to begin the festivities. Since 1892, beer has been served in glass jugs. And in 1896, grand halls were built in place of old sheds due to the hosts of Oktoberfest collaborating with brewers. Much later in 1960, the horse races ended and Oktoberfest became what we know it to be today.

Oktoberfest has been held annually except for 24 occasions when it was cancelled due to wars or epidemics. Today, Oktoberfest is bigger than King Ludwig could have ever imagined. With 14 large tents and 21 small ones, there is so much to see and do, it may even become overwhelming in the best way. It certainly seems like an experience you'd want to have at least once in your life. If you have a chance to catch it next year, maybe go see what all the fuss is about.




