The feast day of St Blaise is February 3 and the Catholic Church celebrates his life by a blessing of the throats. This is done by laying two blessed candles crossed on the sides of a person's throat followed by a prayer. To understand why this is done you need to know a little about St. Blaise.

St Blaise was born in the ancient Palestinian village Sebastia just north of Jerusalem around 300 A.D. He started off as a healer and many of the stories told of St Blaise come from the writing of Aetius Amindenus, who was a Greek physician and medical writer. Besides a healer, St Blaise is also called "the physician of souls" and people often turned to him for healing miracles. He retired to a cave to pray while still helping those who came to him.

In 316 A.D the governor of Cappadocia and Lesser Armenia, Agricola, arrested then bishop Blaise for being Christian, as the Roman Empire had been persecuting anyone who would not denounce their Christian faith. While in prison a woman brought her only son to St Blaise in order to heal him. The child was choking on a fish bone; somehow St Blaise was able to rip the fish bone out of the child without harming him. Another woman brought him candles to keep away the dark. These two stories show how the blessing of the throats came about. While in prison he was beaten and whipped and finally beheaded.



Souper Bowl of Caring

On February 2- 3, 2019 the Mahanoy City ACTION Youth Group held their annual Souper Bowl of Caring collection at Saint Teresa of Calcutta church in Mahanoy City and Saint Richards church in Barnesville. Souper bowl of caring is a national project that has 4,067 groups throughout the country and is partners with some NFL teams. Houston Texans being the first to join, others include Dallas Cowboys, Los Angeles Rams, and New York Giants.

The ACTION youth group in Mahanoy city joined the Souper Bowl of Caring in 2003. In the years they have been a part of the organization they have raised \$15,874. This year alone they raised \$1,144 their 4th highest amount. The highest amount raised in 2017 with \$1,501. This year nationwide \$8,779,499 was collected and donated.

Members collect money in their churches after mass the weekend of the super bowl. Each group gets to decide what charity they want to donate to. The money raised this year by the Mahanoy City ACTION youth group went to the Saint Vincent De Paul society a food bank in

The Lunar New Year typically begins with the new moon that occurs between the end of January and the end of February until the full moon ends with the festival of lanterns. During the festival of lanterns the Chinese celebrated on the 15th of February with many featured ancient spiritual traditions. Family and friends exchange red envelopes which contain lucky money. The money is hope for others to start the year with good luck and fortune. Inside there will be different amounts of money ranging from \$5 to 100.

In an interview with Natalie Pham, my cousin who lives in New York, she commented on the lucky money, "Receiving the red envelopes is the best part because I get so much money that I am able to save to buy what I need." Food is the main part of the celebration. The Vietnamese eat meat with xio (sticky rice) and banh chung. Banh tet is a type of rice cake, cu kieu tom kho is picked scallion heads. In Vietnam Tet (Chinese New Year) the streets are loud with firecrackers, people banging gongs, and music playing. All the girls and boys wear long traditional dresses called ao dai which is made of silk.

The origin of Groundhog Day comes from Christian roots. Christians used to go to church on February 2nd with candles to have them blessed, believing that it would bring blessings for the rest of the winter. For the Germans this wasn't enough. They decided on a hedgehog to predict the weather then brought the idea to America but chose a groundhog.

The first official Groundhog happened in 1886 in Punxsutawney, PA. The official date that is used every year since 1886, has been February 2nd, keeping the tradition strong. In 2005, Punxsutawney reached its highest attendance with over 12,000 people there, according to the official Pennsylvania Tourism Office. This year, Punxsutawney Phil did not see his shadow, making it only the 19th time out of 123 (ten years were not recorded.) With Phil seeing his shadow, legend says that we will be experiencing an early spring. Even though people around the world watch to see Phil's prediction, the Groundhog has not been known to be accurate. Meteorologists seem to usually prove Phil wrong many times.
