- JA Financial Literacy® Pennsylvania (Junior Achievement): <u>Half-credit course</u> designed to meet the Pennsylvania standards with options for online and in-person instruction; support and professional development available through a local <u>Junior Achievement office</u>
- Keys to Financial Success (Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia): A <u>semester-long course</u> developed by the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia in partnership with the University of Delaware; covers a comprehensive range of financial literacy topics, with lesson plans, activities, and assessments; course materials are provided free of charge with participation in low-cost professional development
- Next Gen Personal Finance (NGPF) Semester and Full-Year Courses: Complete curriculum
 offering a trimester, semester, and full-year personal finance courses and a financial algebra
 course; includes Spanish materials, interactive lessons, assessments, and aligned professional
 development for teachers
- Take Charge Today (University of Arizona) Introductory and Advanced Courses:
 Research-based <u>courses</u> designed for grades 7–12, with both introductory and advanced options;
 continuously updated, with accompanying teacher training and PD resources; free, verified
 educator account required to access detailed course information

- Cat Insanity (NGPF): Credit score game introduces quirky scenarios to show how decisions raise or lower scores; includes classroom reflection activity
- Claim Your Future (Finance Authority of Maine): After selecting a career, students in the game
 navigate through various living expense choices and to try to balance their budget; associated
 teacher materials
- Con 'Em If you Can (FINRA Investor Education Foundation): Interactive strategy game turns
 players into fraudsters to learn how they work and outsmart them at their own game; associated
 educator guide

- **Credit Clash (NGPF):** Interactive credit-building <u>game</u> highlights strategies to improve and maintain a score; paired with a debrief <u>worksheet</u>
- **Crypto Craze (NGPF):** Cryptocurrency investing simulation game demonstrates volatility and decision-making in digital markets; paired with <u>reflection activity</u>
- **Financial Football (Visa & NFL):** Football-themed financial knowledge <u>game</u> with accompanying student activities and teacher guide allowing individual or head-to-head play (also available in Spanish)
- Financial Lab (PBS and Duke's Center for Advanced Hindsight): Online game with educational videos in which students learn how built-in biases impact financial decisions; includes an educator guide with classroom activities
- **Financial Soccer (Visa and FIFA):** Soccer-themed financial knowledge <u>game</u> with quick play and tournament options (available in numerous languages)
- **Fintropolis (Ally Bank):** A Minecraft <u>world</u> that uses real-world scenarios to introduce and familiarize students and users to financial concepts; associated lesson plans available (Requires Minecraft Education to play)
- **How Money Smart Are You? (FDIC):** A suite of <u>games</u> tests students' knowledge of financial topics, including supplementary resources
- Influenc'd (NGPF): Influencer <u>simulation</u> allows students to experience financial challenges of entrepreneurship and content creation; includes a reflection worksheet
- **Lights, Camera, Budget (PBS):** Students answer <u>questions</u> to prove they have good personal finance skills to keep their budget on track
- Money Magic (NGPF): Budgeting game challenges students to help Enzo reach a savings goal;
 paired with classroom reflection materials
- **NeighborMood (FoolProof Foundation):** App-based <u>game</u> teaching students to avoid scams, recognize manipulative marketing, and resist impulse buying with associated lesson plans
- Payback (NGPF): College financing game requires players to balance loans, academics, and lifestyle choices; comes with debrief worksheet (also available in Spanish)
- Personal Finance Lab: <u>Budgeting</u> and <u>investing</u> games offered in Pennsylvania in partnership with Brighter Financial Futures (check list of <u>counties</u> with free access through sponsorships)
- **Prosperity Quest (Intuit):** Online <u>game</u> allows students to explore income, credit, spending, saving, and investing; allows individual and classroom games; educator materials available
- Shady Sam (NGPF): Loan shark <u>role-play</u> teaches the dangers of predatory lending; includes a reflection <u>activity</u> provided for discussion
- Shady Sam's Slick Wheels (NGPF): Car-buying <u>role-play</u> introduces tactics used by sales
 personnel to maximize their profits at the consumer's expense; accompanied by a reflection
 activity provided for discussion

- STAX (NGPF): Short investing <u>simulation</u> compresses 20 years into 20 minutes and demonstrates diversification, index funds, and dollar-cost averaging; includes a <u>reflection</u> worksheet
- Spent (Urban Ministries of Durham and NGPF): Online <u>simulation</u> places students in a paycheck-to-paycheck lifestyle and forces tough financial decisions; includes student <u>reflection</u> sheet (also available in Spanish)
- **The Neighbormood (FoolProof):** App-based <u>game</u> simulates financial decisions and teaches healthy skepticism; includes a teacher's guide
- The Payoff (VISA): immersive experiential game that simulates using a phone to chat with characters, check their bank account, and more; includes teacher guide, three lesson plans, and assessments
- The Stock Market Game (SIFMA Foundation): Real-time stock trading <u>simulation</u> using a virtual \$100,000 with support for Pennsylvania teachers from <u>Foundation for Free Enterprise Education</u> (check for local or Title I sponsorship options)
